President's Corner

It's a little late for April Fool's Day but since a woman still earns 23 cents per hour less than a man in a similar job position in the United States, the following message from the AAUW Action network is certainly still timely. You and I must take a stand for ourselves, our daughters, and granddaughters. Take action by contacting our congressmen about paycheck fairness. Women deserve equal pay for equal work!

A funny thing happened to Mary Sue this morning.

She was running out the door with her coffee in one hand and her car keys in the other when all of a sudden, a cascade of \$100 bills poured on top of her. Thinking this was strange and grabbing what she could, she got in her car and headed to the highway – but on the road, she saw dozens of women in their cars, surrounded by wads of cash. Moreover, the money just kept pouring down from the sky –

but only on the cars driven by women.

When Mary Sue got to work and opened her latest paycheck, she shook her head in disbelief – it was 23 percent higher than usual! That's when she caught sight of the headline streaming across the bottom of the TV screen:

"Wage Gap Magically Vanishes;
Lost Wages Rain from the Sky,

Mary Sue thought to herself: "It's about darn time."

Appear on Paychecks."

If only this story were true and not an April Fool's joke! Even though none of us can make the wage gap magically disappear any time soon, we can do something to help narrow the gap and give women the pay they deserve.

Tuesday, April 9, is Equal Pay Day, the symbolic day when women's earnings catch up to men's from the year before –

<u>tell the House of Representatives,</u> it's time to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act!

The Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 84/H.R. 377) would close loopholes in the Equal Pay Act, bar retaliation against workers who disclose their own wages to coworkers, and give both employers and employees the tools they need to end unequal pay practices.
