Janice Moore has been teaching Spanish and organizing French and Spanish student exchange programs at Holland Hall Middle School since 1998.

Moore graduated with a BA in Spanish from Colorado University in Boulder in 1976. She has taught English as a Second Language and Spanish at various schools around the US and Spain since her graduation.

Janice has taken many 13-15 year olds to visit Spain, France, and other countries in Europe. She was also responsible for setting up a student exchange program for Holland Hall with a school in Tulsa's sister city in Mexico, San Luis Potos. 

# **Notes from AAUW**

## **Congress passes VAWA**

The House of Representatives has voted to approve the Senate-passed Violence Against Women Act reauthorization. The bill now goes to the President's desk for signing. VAWA protects all victims and includes critical campus safety protections. AAUW members can take some credit for urging the passage of this bill. Lisa Maatz, AAUW Public Policy Director, sends her thanks!

## **Women's History Month**

During Women's History Month AAUW will be telling stories of past and current women doing big things. Special attention will be paid to:

- 1. Women in Combat The military has announced the end to the combat ban for women . . . In the same week we learned that **not a single survivor** who had come forward was interviewed during the recent sexual abuse investigation at Lackland Air Force base. Changes are still needed.
- 2. <u>Women in Science, technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM</u> The **official theme** of Women's History Month is *Women Inspiring Innovation through Imagination: Celebrating Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.*
- 3. Women on Screen and Behind the Scene
  After all the **misogyny** that permeated the 2013 Oscars, AAUW is thinking America needs a reminder that there are some awesome women in Hollywood.

4. Women and the Wage Gap We'll be gearing up for **Equal Pay Day** on April 9—the symbolic date when women's earnings "catch up" to men's earning from the previous year.

## **LAF Express**

AAUW adopted the case of Virginia LeBlanc in her lawsuit against Indiana University. LeBlanc, former director of a scholarship program there, claims gender and pay discrimination after allegedly facing resistance when she tried to resolve the pay disparity internally.

AAUW board members tried to attend the hearing on sexual misconduct at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas, but were unable to be seated. The hearing did not hear from any of the survivors of the sexual misconduct; AAUW Program Manager Holly Kearl has been invited to write for the Huffington Post about the survivors who are participating in the LAF-supported lawsuits.

Holly Kearl (see above) will speak about sexual harassment in schools during the 2013 United Nations Commission on the Status of Women on Mar. 6.
