When the writer of one blog discovered, by accident, that she was paid less than her male colleagues, she wasn't sure what to do about it. One older male friend (who employed hundreds of employees) advised her to forget about how much her colleague was making and to worry about whether she was making what she deserved. But she had no idea what the salary range was for entry-level jobs in her field. Fearing retaliation, she did nothing. She did eventually negotiate her way to fair pay, but never recouped the wages lost during the years she was paid less, which also dictated how much she saved for retirement.

AAUW's Impact: 1200

Congressional office visits to protect college access and affordability, reauthorize VAWA, prevent bullying and harassment, pass the Paycheck Fairness Act, and eliminate workplace discrimination.

"No documents, no history"

"No documents, no history" was the motto of the World Center for Women's Archives, an idea developed in 1935 by historian, archivist, and AAUW member Mary Ritter Beard. She was a woman historian during a time when history was being written almost exclusively by men. Beard proposed a unique idea to collect the records of women's contributions throughout history and centralize them in a World Center for Women's Archives. She assembled a well-known force of sponsors and supporters, including Eleanor Roosevelt, Amelia Earhart, Carrie Chapman Catt, Georgia O'Keefe, Frances Perkins, Margaret Sanger, and AAUW's own General Director Kathryn McHale, to name a few. The center never got off the ground due to lack of financial support, but collections of women's documents were saved, and exist at the Schlesinger Library on the History of Women in America at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study, and the Sophia Smith Collection at Smith College. The work continues to bring back the World Center for Women's Archives.
