
Branch Notes

Tech Trek TU Facts

- Schusterman Foundation Challenge Matching grant is \$15,000.
- Tech Trek camp will serve 36 girls from minority and underserved populations.
- ◆ Cost for one girl is \$1,000 for the 1-week camp.
- Girl's family pays only \$50, a registration fee.
 We will be seeking donations to help families cover this fee.
- The camp is for rising 7th graders (summer between 7th and 8th grades).
- Girls must be nominated by their teachers and/ or school counselors and be selected on the basis of academic talent, willingness to try new and challenging tasks as well as exhibit responsibility, honesty, respectfulness and accountability.
- Preference will be given to girls from Tulsa, Washington, Osage, Nowata, Wagoner, Cherokee, Craig, Mayes, Okmulgee, Creek, Craig, Adair, Rogers, Ottawa, Delaware and Pawnee Counties.

Financial Tidbits

When you are donating funds for Tech Trek, or recruiting donors, all funds need to go through the national AAUW office as a tax-deductible donation. That is the reason that checks should be made out to AAUW, with the memo as listed in the next article.

Some camps have successfully sold T-shirts and other items in the past. However, buyers cannot write these items off as tax-deductible donations.

Sexual Violence at Colleges and Universities

The regulations requiring colleges and universities to take new steps to end sexual violence are now final! Since they don't go into effect immediately, the Department of Education has asked schools to make "good faith" efforts to comply now. We have a responsibility to hold them accountable.

What can we do? Check your school's annual security report to see if it contains the information required (check the AAUW blog). You can stop by

the website of your alma mater, a local college or university, or the school your kids, friends, or relatives attend. Just type "annual security report" in the search bar. If you can't find it, that is worth noting!

A school's security report should have been updated on or by October 1. It should include new statistics on domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking incidents, and it should mention the steps the school is taking to comply with the new campus safety law.
