AAUW members have worked diligently over the past year to educate and energize voters. Our voter guides covered races up and down the ballot and our issue guide provided background and questions that allowed voters to directly engage with candidates on the issues that matter most to them.

Encourage your networks to make sure friends and family know where and when they are going to vote, and that they know what they need for the polls (transportation, assistance for those with diabetes, identification requirements).

If you experience a problem or see one at the polls, call the Election Protection Hotline (1-866-OUR-VOTE).

You have the power to elect officials who represent your voice and interests, but first you have to show up! Voters are the only ones who can hold candidates and elected officials accountable.

Did you know that Title IX affects educational gender equity beyond sports? It applies also to access to STEM fields and others, protection from sexual harassment and assault, rights for pregnant and parenting students, and more.

After the Election: Looking Toward 2017

In 2016, AAUW members were busy passing good laws, beating back bad ones, and laying the ground work for more successes in 2017.

- ◆ A southern representative has worked closely with her AAUW State Public Policy Chair to conceptualize and draft the language of the prospective bill—a bill that would strengthen the state's equal pay laws.
- ♦ Massachusetts and California have succeeded in passing laws banning the use of salary history. The federal bill that was recently introduced in Congress follows the Massachusetts model.
- ◆ AAUW has long supported access to STEM fields; our resources help lay out a path for states looking to implement policies that encourage growth in the STEM fields.
- ◆ Two states California and Oregon—now allow women to obtain birth control from trained pharmacists, rather than having to see a doctor. Eleven other states introduced similar legislation during their 2016 sessions. Some caution is recommended, however. The Affordable Care Act guarantees contraceptive coverage with no out-of-pocket costs to the patient. Moving them to over-the-counter could introduce additional barriers for women concerning costs.
- ◆ In Oklahoma, both chambers voted to pass a bill that would have increased fines on employers who discriminated in pay. However, policy makers were unable to reconcile two different versions of the legislation before the session ended. Hopefully they will try again in 2017.
