

# **Tech Trek Plans Ongoing**



Plans for the **2014 Tech Trek Tulsa** are evolving every day!

AAUW has approved our application and our Tech Trek is now listed on the national AAUW website. Site Director Xan Black will be in Washington, D.C. next week for the Tech Trek training; we are looking forward to hearing from her upon her return.

The budget has been set; \$32,900 will fund the week-long camp for 50 middle school girls. The girls pay only \$50 for the camp. Luckily, the Schusterman Foundation has stepped up and pledged \$15,000, if we (Tulsa Branch) can match it! So, our work is cut out for us. We hope to receive some help from the Tahlequah and Stillwater branches.

STEM education has been causing a lot of debate lately. Every week we see news items relating to STEM. Currently the United States ranks 25th in math and 17th in science among developed nations.

STEM jobs are growing rapidly in number every year. The STEM workforce suffers because women are greatly underrepresented in these fields. Tech Trek is designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in STEM among rising eighthgrade girls.

Tech Trek assures girls that they are just as capable as their male counterparts, and exposes them to daily labs, workshops, and field trips to increase their active engagement and exploratory learning.

The girls are also surrounded by successful women role models. Held on college campuses, the camps give attendees a peek into college life and help them envision themselves going on to pursue higher education,.

Tech Trek alumnae not only complete a higher number of science and math courses in high school than the national average, but they also attend college at a higher rate.

AAUW's upcoming research report, *Moving the Needle: Women in Engineering and Computing*, will feature the latest data on girls' achievement in subjects related to engineering and computing, how few women are working in these fields, and what can be done.

### **Mission & Action**

#### The Gender Pay Gap in Oklahoma

According to the most recent statistics from the US Census Bureau, the median earnings for U.S. women working full time, year-round were just 78 percent of U.S. men's median earnings. Progress to close the gap has stalled during the last decade and the gap is even larger for women of color and for moms.

In Oklahoma, women's earnings ratio is only 75 percent. Median earnings for men in Oklahoma were \$42,116 compared to women's median earnings of \$31,539.

In Oklahoma District 1, Bridenstine's district, median earnings for men are \$45,330, for women, \$33,321, a ratio of 74%. In District 2, Mullin's district, median earnings for men are \$39,390, and for women, \$29,656, a ratio of 75%. So, you can see Oklahoma's pay gap for women is even worse than the national average.

It's clear the pay gap is unlikely to go away on its own. That's why AAUW and our more than 170,000 members and supporters are leading a nationwide campaign to close the pay gap and end pay discrimination. Go to FightForFairPay.org for more information.
