Oklahoma Women's Coalition One Voice Luncheon



The SIMPLE TRUTH about the Gender Pay Gap

(Fall 2017 Edition)

AAUW's research paper, The SIMPLE TRUTH about the Gender Pay Gap, was first published in 2011. In 2016 AAUW updated the report. Here are several points:

- ► According to AAUW, the pay gap won't close until 2119.
- ► There isn't just a gender pay gap—there's also a racial pay gap.
- ► Women working full time in the U.S. are typically paid just 80 percent of what men were paid.
- ► Women in every state experience the pay gap, but in some states it's worse than others.
- ▶ Data show that in almost every occupation men are paid more than women.
- ► Researchers have found that pay drops for the entire field when women enter traditionally "male" fields.
- ▶ In 2016 women ages 20-24 were paid 96 percent of what men were paid, decreasing to 78-89 percent from age 25-54. By the time workers reach 55-64 years old, women are paid only 74 percent of what men are paid.
- ► While education increases earnings, it doesn't

reduce the pay gap. At every level of academic achievement, women's median earnings are less than men's median earnings. In some cases, the gap is larger at higher levels of education!

- ▶ One result of the pay gap is that women are less able to pay off their student loans promptly, leaving them paying more and for a longer time than men.
- ► Women hold nearly two-thirds of outstanding student debt in the United States.

CHANGES THAT CAN HELP CLOSE THE WAGE GAP

<u>For companies</u> AAUW urges companies to conduct salary audits to proactively monitor and address gender-based pay differences. It's just good business!

<u>For individuals</u> Women can learn strategies to better negotiate for equal pay. AAUW's salary negotiation workshops help empower women to advocate for themselves when it comes to salary, benefits, and promotions.

For policy makers The Paycheck Fairness Act would improve the scope of the Equal Pay Act — which hasn't been updated since 1963 — with stronger incentives for employers to follow the law, enhance federal enforcement efforts, and prohibit retaliation against workers asking about wage practices. Tell Congress to take action for equal pay!

AAUW Educational Funding and Awards

AAUW is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women. Deadlines are nearing for Fellowships and Grants, listed below.

American Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks.

Funding: \$6,000-\$30,000 Deadline: November 15, 2017

Community Action Grants

Who may apply: Individuals, AAUW branches and states, and nonprofit organizations to fund innovative programs or nondegree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls

Funding:

One-year grant, \$2,000-\$7,000 Two-year grant, \$5,000-\$10,000 **Deadline:** January 15, 2018

Career Development Grants

Who may apply: Women pursuing a certificate or degree to advance their careers, change careers, or reenter the workforce and whose bachelor's degree was received at least five years before the award period

Funding: \$2,000-\$12,000 Deadline: December 15, 2017



International Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time graduate or postdoctoral study in the United States who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents

Funding: \$18,000-\$30,000 Deadline: December 1, 2017

International Project Grants

Who may apply: Alumnae of AAUW's International Fellowships program who are living in their home countries and pursuing community-based projects to improve the social advancement and economic empowerment of women and girls

Funding: \$5,000-\$7,000 **Deadline:** January 15, 2018

Selected Professions Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study in a master's or professional degree program in which women are underrepresented, including STEM, law, business, and medicine

Funding: \$5,000-\$18,000 Deadline: January 10, 2018

If the deadline falls on a weekend, the deadline is the next business day.

Urge Congress to Pass the Dream Act of 2017

The Dream Act of 2017 is a bipartisan bill that would provide a path to legal status for undocumented young individuals who came here before the age of 18 and who graduate from U.S. high schools and attend college, enter the workforce, or enlist in a military program. The impact of this legislation has the potential to reach hundreds of thousands of immigrants across the country, specifically providing immigrant women and girls with the educational and career opportunities that generations of Americans have relied on to achieve economic prosperity.

Send a message to your member of Congress now and urge him to stand up for young immigrants by passing the Dream Act of 2017 without amendment.

Department of Education Rescinds Crucial Title IX Guidance

Kim Churches, CEO of AAUW, has issued a statement responding to Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos' announcement concerning the weakening of Title IX policy. In part, Churches said, "AAUW is disappointed that the Department of Education has withdrawn the 2011 Dear Colleague Letter on Sexual Violence as well as the 2014 Questions and Answers on Title IX and Sexual Violence. Both were critical guidance tools schools requested to clarify their responsibilities under Title IX when responding to sexual violence.

"AAUW looks forward to weighing in as the Department of Education engages in its stated rule-making process. In the meantime we call on schools to continue to uphold students' civil rights. AAUW stands with survivors and will vigorously defend Title IX and the protections it affords all students."
