Urge the U.S. Senate today: OPPOSE Betsy DeVos for Secretary of Education

AAUW is joining the opposition to Betsy DeVos' approval; if confirmed she would put the education of women and girls at risk.

During her hearing, DeVos:

- 1. Did not agree to **uphold and enforce** the U.S. Department of Education's Title IX guidance.
- 2. Did not agree that all schools receiving federal funds should **follow civil rights laws.**
- 3. Did not commit to **supporting public education** and to not privatize education.
- Failed to answer basic questions about her responsibilities as Secretary regarding school accountability. She also did not demonstrate an understanding of the Secretary's role to ensure schools support students with disabilities.

Make your voice heard before the Senate holds a vote on DeVos' confirmation. A panel of the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions will hold an executive session on Tuesday, January 31, to vote on her confirmation. Tell your senators to stand up for public education and civil rights by opposing Betsy DeVos for Secretary of Education!
