Women in History

Harvard's First Professional Astronomer Was a Woman

Cecilia Payne-Gaposchkin began her studies at the University of Cambridge in 1919. Since Cambridge didn't grant degrees to women until 1948, she was not awarded a certificate although she finished her courses.

Cecilia moved to Radcliffe College, the allwomen's school at Harvard, where she studied astronomy. Her studies were funded in 1923 in part by the AAUW Rose Sidgwick International Fellowship, a fund established for women graduates of British universities to study in the U.S.

After just two years there, Payne-Gaposchkin became the very first person to receive a doctorate in astronomy from Harvard. The results of her dissertation became the standard, and the Harvard Observatory became her base of study and platform for expertise on variable stars.

Payne-Gaposchkin met her husband at the Observatory; she later scandalized the academic community by giving a major lecture while five months pregnant (*gasp!*) She was the first woman to become a full professor at Harvard, and the first to chair a department there.

While receiving many awards and effecting groundbreaking academic and scientific achievements, Payne-Gaposchkin raised three children and even claimed that to be the harder job. In a 1957 AAUW publication, she was quoted, "I always regret extremely the suggestion that a life of research should preclude domestic happiness."

AAUW further honored Payne-Gaposchkin by granting her an Achievement Award in 1957 for work in spectroscopy and photometry, and her groundbreaking professional advancement at Harvard.

It is heartening to think that AAUW, a much younger organization in 1923, played a role in the education of such a woman. You can read more about Payne-Gaposchkin in her autobiography, *The Dyer's Hand*.



Do you know what you need to save for retirement?

You may be relying on an investment adviser to help you understand your options — but many advisers are not legally prohibited from giving you false or misleading advice that is not in your best interest. The House of Representatives will soon vote on a bill that would delay a new rule to ensure you are receiving the most accurate investment advice for your retirement savings.

The misnamed "Retail Investor Protection Act" (H.R. 2374) would delay the Dept. of Labor from updating its rule requiring investment advisers to be free from conflicts of interest that might benefit them at the expense of you, their client. This bill is bad for everyday workers and their families.

Stop Stupak National Day of Action

On Wednesday, Dec. 4, AAUW and coalition partners will join forces for a National Day of Action to protest the Stupak amendment, anti-choice legislation that would jeopardize women's access to complete and safe reproductive health care coverage. The Stupak amendment was included in the House-passed health reform bill; this was the

biggest attempt to effectively ban abortion services in years. Similar amendments are already in the works in the Senate.

If you can't make it to D.C., let your representatives know how you feel.

Elect Her—Campus Women Win

<u>Elect Her—Campus Women Win</u>, a program designed to expand the pipeline of women running for elected office in college and beyond, heads to 50 colleges and universities in 27 states, the District of Columbia, and Jamaica next year.

After the last cycle of trainings, 88 percent of the Elect Her participants who ran for student government president won!

"More women see themselves as leaders because of Elect Her", said AAUW Executive Director Linda D. Hallman. "....they change the conversation, ... If there had been more women's voices on both sides of the table, the recent government shutdown may have been avoided altogether."

20 women now serve in the Senate; women are still underrepresented at all levels of government. In the top 50 colleges, men account for more than two-thirds of student government presidents even though nearly 60 percent of college students in the U.S. today are women.
