### Pay Gap Stuck at 20 Cents

AAUW's analysis of recently released U.S. Census Bureau data shows that the gender pay gap remains

stagnant — women still make just 80 cents on the dollar compared to men. This is an important opportunity to advocate for stronger pay equity protections to lawmakers and voters alike.

- Submit a Letter to the Editor that calls on local, state, and federal lawmakers to take action.
- Host candidate forums and ask your candidates about what steps they would take to close the gender pay gap.
- Take a state policy guide roadmap to meetings with state legislators or members of Congress and ask for their support of strong legislative solutions.
- Use AAUW's Two-Minute Activist tool to fight for fair pay!
