

Provenzano is serving on several Committees: Children, Youth and Family services; Common Education; Subcommittee on Non-Appropriated Agencies; Sub-committee on Public Safety.

Three different interim studies that focus on public education policy have been requested by Rep. Provenzano. One topic is Creating the Workforce Oklahoma Businesses Need. A second is to update Virtual School Attendance Policies in order to support virtual charter schools. The third

request is to examine the Student Loan Debt crisis. These studies address top concerns among business leaders, educamans.

Ms. Provenzano earned a BS in Organismic Biology from Northeastern State University and a Masters in Educational Administration from the University of Oklahoma.

She has been the Principal at Hale Junior High, Assistant Principal for Bixby Public Schools, Assistant Principal and teacher at Booker T. Washington High School and biology teacher at Will Rogers High School.

Rep. Provenzano is married with 2 children and 2 stepchildren.

In 1869, a group of forward-thinking women in Philadelphia established America's first animal shelter — the Women's Humane Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Now, the shelter is still saving the lives of homeless and abused pets 150 years later.

These women were outraged over the way animals were pulled off the streets and euthanized at the city's pound. Philadelphia philanthropist Caroline Earle White and 30 other women successfully petitioned the mayor of Philadelphia to let them take over the facility so they could work to find homes for strays that had been picked up. They came up with the phrase "animal shelter" and the whole concept. And this concept endures today and carries on this legacy all across the country to find loving homes for homeless pets!

Women's Equality Day was August 26, marking the adoption of the nineteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. In 2020 we will celebrate the centennial of the 19th Amendment receiving approval in enough states to be passed.

Not all women were able to exercise the right to vote immediately. We will have many opportunities to acknowledge the many different challenges women face, our accomplishments, and the work still to be done.

Oregon became the most recent state to enact a paid family and medical leave bill. AAUW of Oregon members were part of the coalition advocating for the law, which will go into full effect in 2023.

Illinois successfully updated their law to include a ban on using salary history during the hiring process, a practice that can carry forward past pay inequities.

Both New Jersey and Toledo, Ohio have passed salary history bans.

THE AAUW 5 PROGRAM

AAUW is launching a *Five Star Recognition Program* to celebrate the efforts of AAUW states, branches and other affiliated AAUW organizations as they continue to advance gender equity on the community, state and national levels.

Recognition can be earned through five major focus areas:

- Advancement by supporting the greatest needs fund or one of the strategic plan's focus areas;
- 2. Communications & External Relations by using web and social media that feature Work Smart Online:
- Programs that align with the strategic plan;
- **4. Public Policy & Research** by moving AAUW's Public Policy agenda forward; and
- Governance & Sustainability by ensuring effective leadership succession and strategic plan alignment.

The 5 Star Program began July 29, 2019, and ends June 30, 2020. Every AAUW affiliate is a participant and can be recognized for their efforts.

AAUW partners with NYC

AAUW has partnered with the New York City Economic Development Corporation (NYCEDC) to teach 10,000 women in the Big Apple how to negotiate for higher salaries and advocate for themselves at work.

The initiative — called "Ask for More" — includes online training and a series of in-person workshops. Plans are also under way to develop Spanish-language training and programs tailored to specific industries.

AAUW CEO Kim Churches states, "Our goal is for every woman to be able to articulate their value and negotiate their financial futures."

Nearly 80,000 women have registered in AAUW's Work Smart Salary-negotiation program since its inception in 2015.

USA Women's Soccer Team and AAUW talk pay equity

Since the U.S. Women's national Soccer Team won the Women's World Cup, the team has continued their off-the-field fight for fair pay. Deborah J. Vagins, AAUW's Senior Vice President for Public Policy and Research, met with members of the team, actors Natalie Portman, America Ferrera and Brie Larson, and other advocates to talk about how to change pay equity policies, including supporting the federal Paycheck Fairness Act.

New figure for Statues for Equality On August 26 — Women's Equality Day — a

life-size statue of scholar and humanitarian Tererai Trent was unveiled by Statues for Equality inn New York City. The monument will strand alongside sculptures of Oprah Winfrey, Jane Goodal, Gabby Douglas and others. Trent is a 2001-02 AAUW International Fellow alumna who delivered an inspiring talk at the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders in May.

Victories in the Courts

An LAF (Legal Advocacy Fund) supported case, *Portz v. St. Cloud State University*, has been decided in favor of female student athletes. The students alleged gender discrimination in violation of Title IX.

U.S. District Court in the Eastern District of Virginia sided with transgender student Gavin Grimm, ruling that his former high school's refusal to let him use the bathroom that aligned with his gender identity constituted discrimination under Title IX. AAUW signed onto an amicus brief supporting Grimm at an earlier stage in the case.

Did you know?????

In 1969, the same year Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin walked on the moon, AAUW member Nancy Grace Roman won NASA's Exceptional Scientific Achievement Medal. Roman, who died last year, was NASA's first chief astronomer, and she occasionally explained a thing or two to the Apollo 11 astronauts.

In 1888 scholar Ida Street received AAUW's first fellowship — \$350. Today, AAUW is one of the largest funding sources for women's graduate education, awarding \$4.3 Million to 270 women and community projects for the 2019-20 academic
