Melissa Provenzano is a lifelong Tulsa area native, married mom to two sons and stepmom to two daughters.

Provenzano comes from a background in education, having served as the Principal at Hale Junior High, Assistant Principal for Bixby Public Schools, Assistant Principal and teacher at Booker T. Washington High School, and biology teacher at Will Rogers High School.

In the 57th Legislature, Ms. Provenzano serves on many committees: Administrative Rules, A & B Education, Common Education, County & Municipal Government, Special Conference Committee on Common Education, and State & Federal Redistricting Tulsa County Subcommittee.

The Equal Rights Amendment's progress in Oklahoma is our topic of the day, but we are also interested in hearing about legislation on teacher retention, the Oklahoma Student Borrower's Bill of Rights (which went into effect Nov. 1), Medicaid expansion, and HB 1593 (expansion of professional development for teachers.)

Representative Melissa Provenzano is now serving her second term in the Oklahoma House of Representatives. She serves District 79, covering a portion of east Tulsa and Broken Arrow, which includes zip codes 74012, 74133, 74135, 74136, and 74145.
