MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

Tulsa Branch members voice many different reasons for joining. It might be to network with other women, to expand understanding of current issues through Branch programming and national communications, or to meet new people, especially when you have recently moved to Tulsa. One very important reason is to support advocacy and equity for women and girls. National recently updated the research on the pay check gap as copied here:

A 2022 update of AAUW's signature report, "The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap", shows that in 2021 women were paid just 84 cents for every dollar paid to men when comparing full-time, year-round workers. However, when the calculation included all workers, the earnings discrepancy is substantially larger: Women took home only 77 cents for every dollar men did.

What better reason for joining AAUW than to advocate for equitable wages for women. Please extend an invitation to family, friends and recent graduates to join.

Equal Pay Day—not much improvement

March 14 was Equal Pay Day 2023, and the current state of the gender pay gap is still too wide. Women working full-time, year-round are paid 84 cents, and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid 77 cents on average for every dollar paid to men.

Pay Equity will remain an AAUW priority until the pay gap is fully eliminated. Congress took the first step last week, introducing the bipartisan Paycheck Fairness Act. When passed, this act will ensure all women have the tools they need to challenge discrimination in the workplace and all employers have the incentives they need to comply with the law.

Contact your members of Congress, write a letter to the editor, to keep this inequity in front of the public.
