MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

Native Women's Equal Pay Day is November 30. Native women working full-time, year-round are paid 57 cents and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid 51 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

Native American women have the greatest discrepancy in pay in the United States. What can AAUW do to help? More advocacy? Offering more pay negotiation workshops?

News 'n Notes from National AAUW

Updated gender pay gap data



In a calculation of the current Population Survey (CPS) comparing full-time, year-round workers, AAUW found women took home only 84% of the pay that men did—a figure that is not statistically different from 2020's pay gap.

"Despite pay discrimination becoming illegal in the United States 60 years ago, today's data reveals the gender pay gap remains persistent," said Gloria L. Blackwell, CEO of AAUW. "We don't accept this."

"Legislators and employers must do better," said Blackwell. "AAUW won't stop fighting until all women are paid fairly and have the same opportunities to build secure economic futures for themselves and their families."

Looking closer at specific groups of women, AAUW found even more startling inequities, compared to the pay of white, non-Hispanic men:

- Latina women workers are paid 52 cents for every dollar.
- Black women workers are paid 66 cents for every dollar
- White women workers are paid 74 cents for every dollar
- Asian American women workers are paid 89 cents for every dollar

The wage gap for many women of color is not only wider than the overall gender wage gap, but it is also closing more slowly.

In dollars and cents, the wage gap for women overall is \$11,450. This money could be spent on childcare, to pay off student debt, invested in home ownership, or be saved for retirement.

Strengthen the Voting Rights Act

The landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965 stopped states from enacting racially discriminatory voting restrictions. The 2013 Supreme Court decision gutted key protections in that Act, making way for 300+ new discriminatory and restrictive voting laws introduced across the country.

The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act would restore and strengthen the protections of the Voting Right Act. The bill would prevent the adoption of discriminatory voting practices before they go into effect.

Learn how your members of Congress previously voted on the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act and ask them to support it. [Spoiler Alert: NONE of Oklahoma's members of Congress voted for it.]

Title IX Update

The U.S. Department of Education is developing rules to strengthen the civil rights protections in Title IX, the law that prohibits sex discrimination in federally funded education programs.

The rules were expected to be finalized by October, however, that deadline is not likely. In June, AAUW joined a coalition of organizations in a letter to the Biden-Harris administration expressing our deep disappointment in the lack of urgency of finalizing these rules prior to the 2023-2024 school year.

AAUW Recommends Passage

A number of AAUW-endorsed bills were reintroduced in Congress in September:

- The <u>Schedules That Work Act</u> and <u>Part-Time</u> <u>Worker Bill of Rights Act</u> would give workers more certainty about their hours and incomes.
- The <u>Tyler Clementi Higher Education Anti-Harassment Act</u> would require colleges and universities receiving federal funding to establish anti-harassment policies and bullying based on sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, and more.
- The Student Loan Deferment for Sexual Violence Survivors Act would create a student loan deferment option for survivors of sexual violence and sex-based harassment who temporarily withdraw from their school for mental and physical rehabilitation.
