School Voucher Bills

National AAUW partners with others in a coalition to share information and resources. A recent topic was school vouchers. 17 states have instituted or expanded school voucher programs in the past year alone.

You can keep track of what is happening in the Oklahoma Legislature through <u>BillTrack50</u>. Register at their site and you can see the bills moving (or not moving!) through our legislature. You can sign up to be notified when bills on a certain subject are being considered.

AAUW and ERA

As the rights of women remain under attack, in December AAUW members took to the streets of Washington, D.C. — as we did nearly 50 years ago — to demand equal rights for all. AAUW CEO Gloria Blackwell stated there, "The U.S. is the only modern democracy that does not include sex equality in its Constitution. AAUW is happy to be a founding member of ERA Coalition's National Strategy Task Force."

We call for the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) to be recognized as the 28th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, 100 years after its first introduction in Congress.

Title IX rules soon to change

In response to the consistent advocacy of students and AAUW members around the country, the Administration announced that the muchdelayed final Title IX rules should be released in March.

For more than three years, students have been devastatingly impacted by the Trump-era Title IX rules, which narrowed the definition of sexual harassment and added measures that rolled back civil rights protections for student survivors of harassment or assault and LGBTQ students.

Sarah Biscarra Dillev (American Fellowship 2021-22)

Sarah Biscarra Dilley is a multidisciplinary Artist, writer, educator and member of the Northern Chumash Tribe. Their text -based, curatorial, educational, and visual work has been exhibited nationally and internationally, including at the Smithsonian Institute, SFMOMA, and Native American and Indigenous Studies Association (NAISA).

Dilley is self-taught in two dialects of the Chumash language and collaborates with others that also are studying the dialects. Dilley is a Ph.D. Candidate in the Department of Native American Studies at UC Davis.
